COOLING BEVERAGES

Serve your guests a cooling beverage when they drop in for bridge or for an informal visit. With some coffee syrup...

COFFEE MILK SHAKE

Combine three tablespoons of coffee syrup with three-fourths cup rich milk and a little crushed ice. A drop or two of vanilla may be added if desired.

COFFEE EGGS NOG

3 tablespoonful coffee syrup scant 1/2 cup rich milk 1 egg few drops vanilla Heat the egg in a bowl, add the vanilla, the coffee syrup and milk, beat again to blend it thoroughly.

BAKED PEAR DESSERT

1 junket tablet 1 pint milk 1/2 cup water 1/4 teaspoon vanilla 3/4 cup sugar 1/2 cup water and cinnamon candies together for 5 minutes. Add the lemon juice. Pour the syrup over the pears and bake until tender.

FISH SALAD CALIFORNIAN

1/2 cup lemon pulp and juice 2 cups shredded lettuce 2 cups canned salmon (or tuna) 3 tablespoons minced pimento Pare lemons, saving all juice, and cut in small pieces, as free as possible from membrane. Mix with lettuce. Add fish, which has been flaked, and pimento. Mix thoroughly. Serve with Mayonnaise.

FROZEN FRUIT PUNCH

3 cups sugar 1 1/2 cups water 1 small burnt mint 1/2 cup lemon juice 3 cups weak tea or ginger ale 2 cups orange juice Boll sugar, water and mint together for 5 minutes. Chill, add remaining ingredients, strain and freeze.

ORANGE MARRASMALLOW PUFF

1 cup cream 1/2 cup sugar 1 cup quartered marshmallows 1 cup orange pulp and juice Whip cream until thick, fold in other ingredients. Serve cold.

THE OLD MAN OF THE BIG CLOCK TOWER



This week I give the balance of this historical data gleaned from the glass jar found in the old Presbyterian Church in Milton.

Items of interest concerning Milton County in this volume of 1856 will prove of passing interest to you all. Acres, 229,700; population, about 20,000; assessed value, in 1855, £1,000,000; average amount taxes, £2,143, 1s. 7d.; liabilities, no return. Amount of debentures, listed, £3,000.

The County officials then were: Robert Millar, Milton, Warden; Geo. Brown, Milton, Treasurer; Thomas Tracey, Milton, Registrar; Francis Hambrugh, Milton, Clerk; Gilbert Tice Bastoda, Milton, Collector; John Whittier, Milton, Surveyor; Joseph Davie, Milton, Judge County Court and Chairman Quarter Sessions; Levi Wilson, Milton, Sheriff; W. L. P. Eager, Milton, Clerk of County Court and Deputy Clerk of Crown; Joe. Davis, Milton, Judge Surrogate; W. L. P. Eager, Registrar, Surrogate; Samuel Clarke, Milton, Crown Lands Agent.

There were five Division Court Clerks and one hundred and twenty Magistrates in the County. I could go on and tell you a lot more of the contents of this old almanac, but that will suffice to show you how complete these volumes were at that date.

"DUST OF GOLD"

The Popular Report, so eagerly looked forward to by all friends of the British and Foreign Bible Society throughout the world in this year entitled "Dust of Gold" a phrase taken from the famous 28th chapter of the Book of Job.

As usual, the Editor draws on literary treasures "old and new" in his treatment of the subject. After the prologue which deals with the history of Gold Mining, the chapters have significant titles: "Treasure sought and found"; "Channels among the rocks"; "To the furthest bound"; "Breaking open a shaft"; "Gold for Gold." Into these chapters Mr. Smith weaves examples of the heroic and daring shown by those who translate and circulate the scriptures, and in a very wonderful way links the search for gold with the outstanding features of the Annual Report.

He is responsible not alone for himself, but for the mistakes of those under him. It is his job, as leader, to see that mistakes do not occur in his organization, for mistakes are costly and cannot be tolerated.

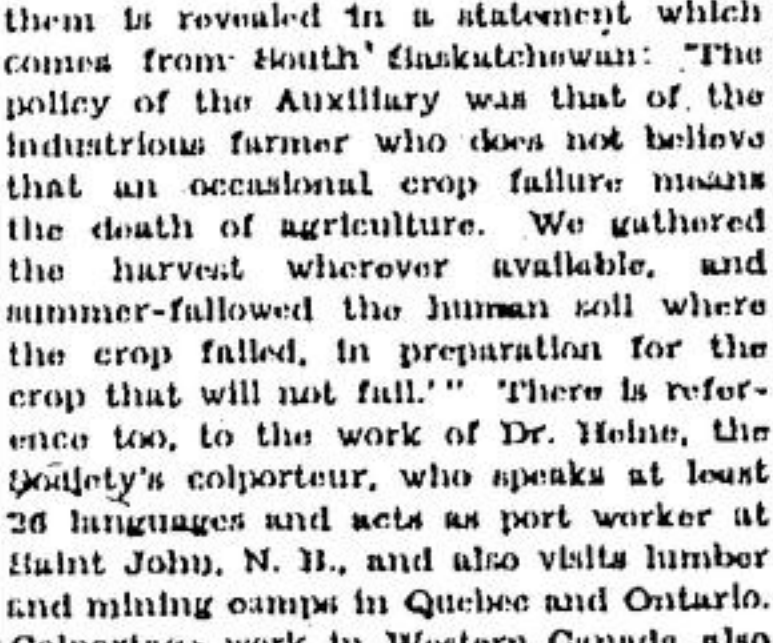

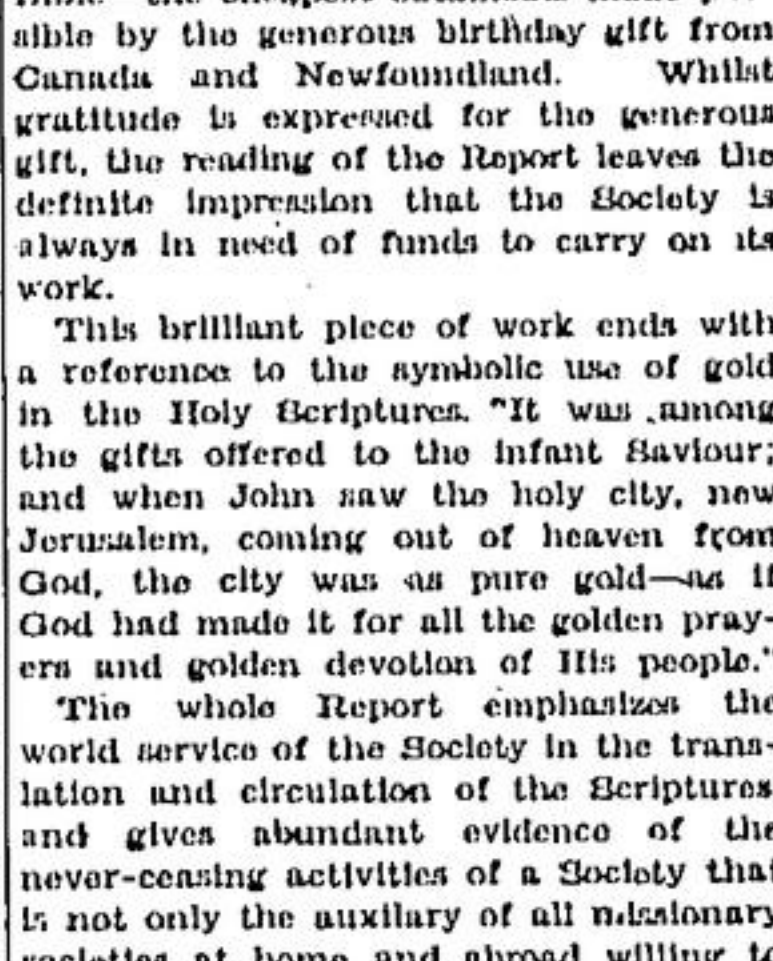
