DESSERTS FOR KIDDIES

Do you want to serve a dessert that will put you high in the estimation of your youthful guests or the kiddies in your own home? Try these and watch little eyes sparkle.

PHOENIX MOLD

1 package gelatin, any flavor 1X cups boiling water 1 pint vanilla ice cream

TROPICAL DESSERT

1 package lemon-flavored gelatin 1 pint boiling water 6 figs, finely chopped 12 dates, seeded and finely chopped 1 banana, thinly sliced

ORANGE-BAVARIAN CREAM

1 tablespoon granulated gelatin 1/2 cup cold water 1 cup orange juice and pulp 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup cream

MUNICIPALITY OF ACTON

SECOND INSTALLMENT--NOVEMBER 16

Any ratepayer may pay the whole of his taxes on or before September 15, but one-half the amount must be paid on or before that date. Failure to comply with this arrangement entails extra expense and trouble.

An addition of five per cent will be made to every tax rate or assessment remaining unpaid four days after the said 15th day of November for the second installment; and it will be the duty of the Collector immediately after the said several days appointed for payment, to collect at once by distress or otherwise, under the provisions of the Statute in that behalf, all such taxes, or instalments of taxes.
