Betrothal or engagement rings have been in use for centuries. As long ago as 1477, when the marriage of the Duke of Austria to the Princess of Burgundy was arranged, the princess gave her consent by sending a very valuable diamond ring as a pledge of her good faith. The ring was selected as a betrothal pledge because in early times it was used as a seal to bind all agreements and was affixed to all important documents.

A marriage custom of great antiquity was the delivery of the keys of the household with the bridal ring. Romans wore their keys attached to finger rings instead of chains, Roman matrons carrying the keys to their lewel caskets on
