2. I do not know of one citizen who is in favor of taking over this bridge. 3. We, as citizens, will not allow any

Mr. John Nicol, who was a Councillor elected Council to take over the bridge without a vote of the ratenavers. 4. Such a vote can be demanded by ratepayers petitioning the Council.

5. The Railway Board is the only official body to legally decide this bane, and it is entirely out of the hands of any Council.
