## FIRE DAMAGED RECTORY

Blaze in Attle at Residence of Father Mettride Caused Considerable Damage on Friday Evening

Just before six o'clock the fire alarm called the Acton Brigade to a fire, that had gotten under way in the attle at the Rectory of St. Joseph's Church, on John Street. The blaze had made considerable headway before it was discovered by Miss Mulholland, who is housekeeper ut the Rectory, and Pather McBride was summoned from the church.

The fire seemed to have got into the space between the plastered ceiling and the roof and kept breaking through on the outside of the roof. The chemical tanks were insufficient to extinguish the blaze and a line of hose from the outside did not have the necessary effect. It was found necessary to take a line of hose into the attic before the blaze could be brought under control.

The water damage was, therefore, considerable and much more serious than the actual fire damage. It is estimated the entire damage to house and contents wi'l run in the neighborhood of \$800. which is covered by insurance.
