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A Year End Review of 1931 From a Local Viewpoint Only

Not the World Events but Gleanings from the News of the Year as Portrayed in Detail Week by Week in the Columns of the Free Press—Many Changes Have Occurred Locally the Past Year in Connection with Local Life and Activities.

This is the last day of 1931 and a new year with its joys and sorrows is before us. We have prepared a brief summary of the events of the past year as chronicled in *The Free Press*, and give it in review. It will bring many recollections. They are not the world events but just the happenings of the immediate community, as portrayed throughout the year from *The Free Press* articles.

JANUARY
First Week—Council held first meeting and formed committees. The funeral of the late Nicholas Forster was held. Obituaries chronicled were Mrs. Julia Goodwin, Miss Margaret Thompson, Miss Sarah Perrin, Peter J. Smith, Winnipeg, David Williamson, Acton Junior Hockey Team lost to Milton, 2-1; and the Intermediates lost to Oakville, 1-0; and to Brampton, 2-1.

Second Week—There was a small fire at the tannery. A school girl was struck by the radial at Dixie and killed. The Commission held first meetings. Deaths recorded were E. H. Hunter, Nelson; Robert Stark, Trafalgar; and Gordon (Buddy) Garvin, of Toronto. Acton defeated Georgetown Intermediates Hockeyists 6-2; and the Juniors lost to Georgetown, 3-1. There were sleighing and skating parties and the snow plows were having a busy time.

Third Week—D. D. Wadsworth was elected President of Acton. Mrs. George Havel was chosen head of the 1931 School Board. Council held meeting, and Obituaries was organized. Deaths recorded were Robert Kuttel, Esquimaux; Wm. McPherson, Oakville; Edward Ryder, St. Catharines; John Bommer, London; Mary Joyce Armstrong, Toronto. In hockey the Intermediates won from Burlington, 3-0; and from Georgetown, 4-2; and the Juniors lost to Georgetown by 5-2; and won from Milton, 4-1.

Fourth Week—Reeve Mason, of Acton, was made Warden of the County. Knox Church annual meeting was held. Acton curlers defeated a Guilf team. There was more snow and very little January thaw. The Intermediates hockeyists won from Georgetown, 4-2; and the Juniors lost to Oakville, 1-0. An exhibition game with Guilf was played.

FEBRUARY
First Week—United Church annual meeting held. Boatrigger sold liquor to young boys and was sent to jail. Dublin Old Boys had re-union. Assault case arising out of Georgetown hockey game settled, and two spectators fined. In hockey, Acton won from Brampton, 2-1; and defeated Burlington in first game of play-offs, 2-0.

Second Week—The Chautauque programmes provided excellent. Officers of the three societies were elected. Deaths recorded were John Reed, of Exeter; and Mrs. Lloyd Liefson, of Guilf. Acton won the group in hockey from Burlington, but lost game, 2-1 to that town. In first play-off Acton won from Caledonia, by 4-2.

Third Week—Council purchased additional cemetery property. A local play, "Betty Ann," was produced. William Allan, of Exeter, passed away at his home there. In hockey, Acton won from Caledonia, 3-1. In the Eloga games, Eloga was eliminated by 3-3 and 2-1. There was snow aplenty, with the cars stuck in the snow-banks.

Fourth Week—New Post of Legion was organized in Acton. E. F. Egan, a former Warden of the County, passed away at Milton. In hockey, Acton beat the locals by 3-1, and then the locals defeated the Stratford team 2-1, losing the round by 4-3.

MARCH
First Week—Council opposed starting of County Health Unit. Deaths recorded were Herbert Brauner, of Detroit; and John K. Adsett, of Guilf. In June hockey, Acton won first game, 1-0; and Georgetown taking second game, 3-2. In the Peter Smith Trophy games, Guilf O. A. C. and Acton played a game, resulting 2-1 for Acton.

Second Week—The Ontario Memorial plant started operations again. Esquimaux Council met, and the County Council decided on reduced salaries. Deaths recorded were Abram Easton, Burlington; Dr. Robert Morrow, Guilf; Mrs. W. D. Anderson, Acton; R. A. Wanless, Exeter. In the Peter Smith game Acton lost to Georgetown, 6-0; and the Peter Smith Trophy, The Intermediates downed Kitchener, 4-3.

Third Week—Rev. C. G. Jones made Moderator of Guild Presbyterian. Daylight Saving by-law was passed. There were several B. Patrick's social functions. The deaths recorded were: Mrs. Jas. Currie, Alexander Arthur, Isaac Baker, William Hawkins, James Burnett and Thomas Smyth. There was a big fall of snow during the week. Acton won at hockey from Hamilton team by 4-3.

Fourth Week—James Clark, of Georgetown, was killed in level crossing accident. Calvin Patterson's barn in Nassagaweya was destroyed. George T. Woods had fatal accident at tannery. The

Cemetery Board at public meeting gave outline of plans. Deaths recorded were Benjamin Cass and William D. Thomas. The highways were clear of snow.

APRIL
First Week—County Council closed session with \$4,000. Petitioners opposed daylight saving in Acton. Public liability insurance causes warm time for Council. The death roll included Joseph C. Moore, George T. Woods, William McLean, Miss George T. Woods, Mrs. A. McAlpine and Mrs. Wm. Pryor. It was Easter week and a snow storm characterized the first day of April.

Second Week—A local play, "What Happened to Brugs," was presented. The Hydro department showed profit of over \$2,000.00. The Easter visitors seemed very numerous, occupying two and a half columns. Deaths recorded were John Bloom, William H. McEwen, William E. Halden, and Donald Sinclair.

Third Week—Esquimaux Council set wages scale for year. A special section of *The Free Press* was devoted to the Legion's organization. The Daylight Saving by-law was revised and work at Fairview Cemetery on new survey was started. Deaths recorded were Mrs. Chas. A. Cameron, Acton; Mrs. Thos. Chisholm, Niagara, Mich.; Mrs. A. McAlpine, Nassagaweya; and Dr. M. E. Gowanlock, Milton.

Fourth Week—Legion Banquet and Church Night was big success. Howston Co. employees held annual frolic. Deaths recorded were Janet A. Little, Milton; Mrs. James Blunt, Exeter; George Miller Glenwilliams; Mrs. P. L. White and Mrs. Andrew Wilson, Milton. Last week—County estimate on roads \$80,666, and County body held two sessions, with Acton Council working with health insurance representatives. The Athletic Association appointed officers and held annual meeting. James Little was instantly killed at Rockwood. Walker Lodge had visit of officials. The hockey and tug-of-war teams were honored by banquet and dance. Deaths recorded: James Little, Exeter; Mrs. C. W. Kelly, Guilf; and Mrs. Norman McEachern, Acton.

MAY
First Week—Acton Schools carried off honors in the County Musical Festival. The Holy Name Society entertained the hockey boys and friends. Deaths recorded were Daniel Nelson, Esquimaux; Blaney McGuire, Orangeville; Byard Hall, Guilf; William W. Brownridge, Georgetown; John A. Henderson, Windsor; Robert Thompson, Shelburne.

Second Week—Council listened to more liability insurance explication. Ifeilon Presbytery of United Church, and Guilf Presbytery of Presbyterian Church met in Acton. The hockey club appointed officials and the editor had been on his annual fishing trip. A new manager came to the Bank of Montreal. Deaths recorded were Mrs. Henry Atkinson, of Acton.

Third Week—A boxing contest was staged in the Arena and Acton won the opening ball game from Kildrife. The School Board inaugurated economies at its meeting. There was the usual plethora of motor accidents and spring activities were occupying much attention.

Fourth Week—Sir Harry Britton visited Acton and entertained at "Moorecroft." Council affirmed assessment roll, with no appeals. Acton won at baseball from Oakville, 6-4. All the Public School staff were re-engaged, and also High School Principal. The Empire Day concert was fine feature.

JUNE
First Week—Z. J. Kerr was appointed Hydro delegate. County Council adopted equalized assessment. Tax rate set for Acton at 49 mills. Presentations to Mr. C. B. Stacey, Miss B. M. Newbush, Miss Florence Johnston and Mr. Chester Allan. Deaths recorded were Mrs. Wm. Mullin, Kenneth Crewson, Miss Mary Hawthorne, Kitchener.

Second Week—I. O. O. F. Decoration Service was held. The Ontario Memorial plant was sold to Kivington Bros. (?) Public Utilities Commission salaries were not mentioned by Council and the judging competition was held in Milton. The High School teachers were engaged by the School Board. The deaths recorded were Elma E. Vanackle, of Trafalgar; John Taylor, Campbellville; Donald Robertson, of Milton.

Third Week—The newspaper men met at Grand Valley. Georgetown beat Acton 2-3 at baseball. The staff of school teachers were all engaged. The plethors of various organizations were popular items. The deaths recorded were: Henry Cole, Archibald McGregor and William Gordon Thornton.

Fourth Week—Acton lost to Georgetown, 5-3, in baseball. Several electric storms did considerable damage in the neighborhood. The liquor interests were campaigning for signatures. Council dealt with bond grants and routine affairs. Deaths recorded were the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Greer, John J. Wilson, Milton; Mrs. George Grunnett, Eramosa.
