#### UNUSUAL PHASE TO FARMING IN ITALY

We are assured by those competent testify in the matter that farming in Italy is attended with excitements and possibilities unknown in America, as Signor Carmine, a Neapolitan, discovered some time ago.

For \$2,000 he bought a tract of land few miles from Rome to use for raising arti-chokes. "One of his workmen, while digging in the ground, struck a large stone and called for assistance in getting it out Signor Carmine responded but the stone was still too big to b moved. The two scraped the soil away and discovered that the stone was marble with the figure of a woman sculptured on one side of it. Two or three other man were called and together they disledged it and put it in the barn. Six other similar marbles were found which evidently formed the base of a statue of a part of a fountain.

The government of Italy has a claim to one-fourth of all such antiquities, and the official erchaeologists, when they heard of his find, offered Signor Carmine \$60,000 for the marbles.
