HOT SOUPS FOR WINTER

Here are two soup secrets that all
should know. First, serve soup piping
hot. Second point up the flavor and help

CHESTNUT PUREE

Either the large French chestnuts or
the small native kinds can be used for
this tempting soup.

- 1 quart chestnuts
1 pint white stock
1 1/2 pints milk
2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons sugar
Salt and pepper

Shell and scald the chestnuts. Heat
the stock and milk, and thicken with
the butter and flour. Add seasonings.

PEANUT SOUP

- 1/2 cup peanut butter
3 cups rich milk
1 tablespoon butter
2 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon sugar
Salt and pepper

Melt the butter, add the flour and stir
until smooth. Add milk gradually, stir-
ring until thickened and flour is cooked.

COCONUT MACAROONS

5 tablespoons sugar
2 egg whites stiffly beaten
3/4 cup shredded coconut, chopped
3/4 teaspoon almond extract
Beat sugar into egg whites and con-
tinue beating until mixture stiffens

CHOCOLATE MACAROONS

1 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 can coconut, Southern style
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate,
melted
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
Combine sugar and salt. Fold gradu-
ally into egg whites. Fold coconut,

SPINACH WITH LEMON

Add lemon juice to cooked spinach,
allowing 1 tablespoon lemon juice to
each cup cooked vegetable. Or spinach
may be served with lemon garnishes,

COLD SLAW OR LETTUCE WITH LEMON DRESSING

Mix thoroughly 1/2 teaspoon salt, dash
of pepper, 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar, 6 table-
spoons coffee cream and 3 tablespoons
lemon juice. Combine with chopped or
shredded cabbage or lettuce. Serve cold.

COWS OF NORMANDY

The Cotentin cows of Normandy,
which their owners believe to be the
best milkers in the world, are long angu-
lar, big-framed, and unprepossessing in
appearance, with heavy heads, necks,
and shoulders, and white crumpled
horns. In color they vary. Brown roan
and red are most numerous, but there
are many piebald and brindled. An
American investigator says that it was
proved to him beyond doubt that these
cows will produce forty pounds of butter
a month during the greater part of the
period of lactation, without any pamper-
ing in food or treatment. All attempts
to improve them by crossing with other
breeds have failed so far as milk-pro-
ducing capacity is concerned.
