#### CANADA EXPORTS MORE

To Great Britain-Increase of More Than Two Millions in Value During Past Month

--- 13 A remarkable increase is shown Canada's domestic exports to Great Britain during the month of February, says a statement issued by the Department of Trade and Commerce.
