PRESERVE THE LINEN

How many women realize that by spending a very few minutes on the care of their linen before sending it to be laundered it can be kept in that perfect condition which is the pride of every good housewife?

When a stain appears, soak it and the area around in cold water. Never allow the article to be boiled before attempting to remove the stain by this cold-water soak. Port wine and fountain pen ink are especially obstinate.

Mildew also requires plenty of soaking, and like scorching, should be bleached in the open air. Use fuller's earth as well as cold water.

The indiscriminate use of chemicals is disastrous and should not be attempted at home. A laundry which takes time in experiment on the best way of removing the last trace of different stains may appear expensive, but is never really so in the long run.

Every article should, of course, be mended before being laundered. Thin places are liable to become holes during the process of laundering, because water must be forced through the fabric at a speed sufficient to dislodge the dirt.
