NICKEL MOST POPULAR COIN ...

The Canadian nickel continues to dominate the operations of the Mint, if the annual figures issued by the new Canadian Government department mean any thing. In the year just closed no fewer than 5.620,000 coins of the five-cent denomination were delivered from the Mint. The number exceeded even that of pennies, of which a paltry 5,140,000. were issued: while dimes were a poor third, only 2.294,000 being minted in The fifty-cent piece appears to have had little demand in this time of depression, for only 68,000 were issued last The humble "two-bits" was coined to the value of \$212,000, or 848,000 pieces, valued at twenty-five cents each. In all, the Royal Canadian Mint struck 11,618. 690 pieces in 1931, and issued 13,970,000. The gross value of rough and fine gold and fine silver received by the Mint last year was \$35,638,178. Deliveries from the institution to the Department of Finance had a value of \$35,176,551. Trade
