# RED CLOVER ENSILAGE

In-regions where red clover grows with success it is usually made into hay but this crop will also produce very palatable silage. As red clover cut in full bleom yields a larger amount of feed nutrients than when cut later, and as earlier cut clover tends to be watery and undesirable for silage, this crop should be cut for silage when it is in full bloom. Two or three hours wilting in the field is not likely to make the silage too dry but longer periods of wilting in dry sunny weather might result in too great a loss of moisture from the red clover lying in the swath. If the cut crop should become very wet from rain, it should be allowed to dry well before ensiling.

ducts industry showed production to a value of \$73,594,894 during 1930, through 2,698 establishments of which 1,071 are located in Ontario and 868 in Quebec. March was the year's best month, to date, for pig iron production in Canada, with a total of

#### PRODUCTION OF FIELD CROPS

The final estimate of the 1931 yields of the grain crops of Canada just issued by the Canadian Government Bureau o Statistics places the total wheat production at 304.144.000 bushels ofrom 26,114,-650 acres, as compared with 420,672,000 bushels from 24.897,900 acres in 1930. The yield of oats was 328,278,000 bushels from 12:871,341 acres, over 95,000,000, bushels less than in the previous year when 13.258,700 acres was under this grain. The 1931 output of barley was eligible. This puts every one on an 67,382,600 bushels from 3,768,269 acres, as compared with 135,160,200. Of the from 5,558,700 acres in 1930. Of the total wheat production the three Prairie Provinces-Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta - accounted for 284,000,000 bushels from 25,352,722 acres; also 183,-700,000 bushels of oats from 8,3111,967

> acres and 50.540.000 bushels of barley from 3,202,727 acres. The aggregate value of the field crops last year is estimated at \$425,065,100 and the total area sown to such crops was 57,964,056 acres.


