Accidents and Compensation

During the month of April there were 3,518 accidents reported to the Workmen's Compensation Board, as compared with 3,836 during March, and 4,061 during April a year ago. The fatal cases numbered 23, as against 25 of last April. The benefits awarded amounted to \$438,164.75, of which \$356, 511.88 was for compensation and \$81,652.87 for medical aid. The benefits awarded during April year ago amounted to \$510,607.55.

If we must have riots and uprisings in Canada, there are plenty of men who have been born and reared in the Dominion who will take up the cudgels for the common people at the proper time. If these men who could not live peaceably in their own country and have had opportunity in Canada and cannot exist under our conditions, they should return to their own land, if not without compulsion, then by force. They do not understand the requirements in this country and their conglomeration of ideas may be a fine theory but i will be a sorry day when they are given the opportunity to put them into practice. It is a pitiable thing when an individual has made himself an un desirable in his own and an adopted country, just whose fault is such a situation?


