(By Betty Barclay) THOSE TASTY BAVARIANS

Add Bavarian cream to your list desserts. You will find it and healthful and economical.

BANANA BAVARIAN package lemon-flavored gelatin

1 pint boiling water 1/4 teaspoon salt

% cup sugar Juice 1 lemon

14 cup cream

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Ad salt, sugar, and lemon juice. Chill until and syrupy. Fold in cream, whipped only until thick and shiny but not stiff. Crush bananas to pulp with silver fork and fold at once into gelatin mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve with or without sauce of tart fresh, fruit.

APRICOT BAVARIAN 1 package strawberry-flavored gelatin 1 pint boiling water and apricot juice

pound dried apricots, cooked and J. W. JONES drained

4 cup sugar Dissolve gelatin in boiling water an apricot juice: Chill until cold and syrups Fold in cream, whipped only until thick and shiny, but not stiff. Crush apricots to pulp with fork, add sugar. Fold apricot mixture into gelatin mixture. Chill until slightly thickened. Turn into mold or pile lightly in sherbet glasses. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serves 6.

BOILED SALAD DRESSING

(Makes 1% cups) 2 eggs

4 tablespoons flour 2 tablespoons sugar

1 teaspoon salt 1/2 teaspoon mustard 14 -teaspoon paprika

114 cups cold water 1 tablespoon butter 1/3 cup lemon juice

Beat eggs slightly. Stir in all dry ingredients. Add water. Cook in saucepan till thickened, stirring constantly. Add butter and lemon juice. Cool. This is a salad dressing without oil and is liked especially by children.

BAKED ORANGE RELISH FOR MEAT (Serves 6-8)

2 large oranges 3 or 4 slices canned pineapple

1 teaspoon cinnamon

a whole cloves 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

½ cup pineapple juice

1/3 cup' sugar -1 tablespoon lemon juice Slice oranges thin, using skin and pulp. Cut up pineapple. Combine all ingredients and place in glass or earthen baking dish. Bake in moderate oven for 2 to 214 hours. This is a delicious relish with

BITTER ORANGE MARMALADE

(Makes 6-8 glasses)

1 grapefruit

2 oranges 1 lemon

¼ cup lemon juice Slice unpeeled fruit very thin. three times as much water as fruit. Boil 20 minutes. Measure. Bring to boiling point. Add 3 cup sugar for each cup of fruit. Boil 25 minutes or until it gives the jelly test. Just before removing from fire add 4 cup lemon juice. Pour into

The most tragic figure of our civilization is the man out of work. As he goes around looking for a job, his carriage suggests that he is apologizing for hisexistence. He does not feel that he has a right to standing room on the planet and every motion shows it. Some of you, when you leave home on a frosty winter morning on your way to work, think regretfully of the warm beds you have left, and wish you might occupy them until you are ready to get up. 1 the morning is particularly cold, you start the day with a well-defined sense of grievance. The hardest job is better than no job, and to start out early on a frosty morning to your work, is infinitely better than lying in bed until noon because it does not matter when you get up.

LARGER YIELDS COST LESS

The production of larger yields per acre is one of the most important methods of reducing the cost of production per bushel or per ton of crop. Many items in the expense in growing a crop are the same whether the crop be small or large, while only a few items vary directly with the yield. Items of expense, such as rent for use of land, preparation of the soil, seed, seeding, cutting and machinery do not vary materially no matter what yield is secured. The costs of hauling and storing, and threshing do vary with the yield but they are relatively a small percentage of the total cost. Larger yields will entail greater, costs per acre, but will give smaller costs per bushel or per ten of crop, unless the cost of the increased yield is greater than its value.


