FARMS RAPIDLY INCREASE

Cochrane County, in Northern Ontario, with 2,490 occupied farms, led all Canada in the census taken June 1, 1931. Since the previous census was taken 10 years ago the number of farms occupied in Cochrane-County has increased from 274 to 2,490, which is an increase of 808.7 per cent. The census figures show 728,244 occupied farms in Canada, as on June 1, 1931, which was a gain of 17,154 in 10 years. A farm, for census purposes, includes every tract of land of one acre or more which produced in the year -1930 agricultural products to the value of \$50 or over, or which was under crop of any kind, or employed for pasturing in 1931.
