Soon after this a mill was built in Milton, where, as William said, they could get their wheat chawed up, and although it was a poor concern, it was a great accommodation.

Trudgen secured the whole lot, the west-half for himself, and the east-half for his son, William. The father and two sons returned to the lot soon after this, built a shanty and cleared a piece of land, put in some crops, and in the month of June, 1822, the parents, their two sons and two of their daughters, came here to their new home.

FARTHEST SOUTH IN CANADA

Canada has a National Park at the point that is farthest south in the Dominion—Point Pelee in Lake Erie, about 40 miles from Leamington and about 80 southeast from Windsor, Ontario. Point Pelee sticks out into Lake Erie like a slender finger.

In addition to its popularity as a recreational area Point Pelee Park is one of the outstanding migratory bird sanctuaries in Eastern Canada. Wild ducks, Canada geese and swans all find a shelter and resting place in the hundreds of acres of marshland contained in the park.

In physical aspect the park is a place of unusual beauty, unique in supporting vegetation of an almost semi-tropical nature, both luxuriant and dense. Flora intruding from the south and rarely discovered in such northern climes, include the peltus plant, red mulberry and many other botanical species indigenous as a rule to more southern areas.

Point Pelee has been connected with many episodes in Canadian history. The park is open to visitors at all times.
