Ontario Will Have Vast Power Supply. Terms of the Dominion-Ontario agreement with regard to the St. Lawrence River development were announced jointly by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and Hon. George S. Henry, Premier of the Province of Ontario. Costs of works solely for navigation, such as locks, are to be assumed by the Dominion.
