Ontario Will Have Vast Power Supply

Terms of the Dominion-Ontario agreement with regard to the St. Lawrence River development were announced jointly by Prime Minister R. B. Bennett and Hon. George S. Henry, Premier of the Province of Ontario. Costs of works solely for navigation, such as locks, are to be assumed by the Dominion. Costs. of works solely for power are to be assumed by Ontario-Ontario building and financing the powerhouse superstructures and power machinery and contributing to the Dominion specified payments to cover the cost of the powerhouse substructures which are being built by the Dominion. Costs of works' common to navigation and power are to be divided between the Dominion and Ontario, so as to apportion the joint saving accruing. from the construction of the navigation, power and common works as a co-ordinated navigation and power project. Premier Henry said it was "estimated by the engineers of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario, who have been advising the Ontario Government throughout the negotiations with the Dominion, that under the agreement between the Dominion and the Province, Ontario will have available, on the completion of the works, approximately.1,000,-000 horsepower, at a capital cost of \$120 per horsepowers thus assuring to the Province a very large amount of cheap
