ANNOUNCING THE OPENING OF THE Acton Egg Grading Station ON Saturday Aug. 20

No Eggs shall be offered for sale, advertised for sale, kept for sale, sold, exposed or displayed by any producer or any person selling or offering eggs for sale or delivering eggs direct to a consumer as a retailer, in a store or in any public place or manner, unless the case or container is marked, labelled, tagged or designated with the correct name of the class and the grade of eggs contained therein according to the Canadian standards and also with the name of the country of origin when other than domestic product.

PENALTIES UNDER THE ACT Any person violating any provision of this Act, or of any regulation thereunder, shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding Three Months, or to both fine and imprisonment.
