> METHODS OF BLANCHING CELERY Who does not like to have celery on the table? It is one of the most easily PIC cultivated plants and one that should

be found in every garden. The plants can be grown by starting seed in the house between the middle and the end of March in a bright window in a flat or shallow box, and transplanting the plants two inches apart into other boxes when the true leaf appears. They may be set in the open any time from early May to Middle June, depending on the season or the district in which crop have been found especially suited to the growth of this crop, more particularly when liberal manuring has been done. The plants are usually set in rows four feet apart and six inches apart in the rows, either in trenches six inches deep or on the level, depending which

blanching system is used. (Extract from Regulations respecting the Grading and Marking of Eggs.)

PENALTIES UNDER THE ACT

Any person violating any provision of this Act, or of any regulation thereunder, shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding Five Hundred Dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding Three Months, or to both fine and imprisonment.
