Farm House on Dundas Highway Burned A spark from a chimney is blamed for a fire which caused \$10,000 damage the blaze. to the old Cordingley farm house, south of the Dundas Highway, late Tuesday. The spark set the roof on fire and the building was destroyed. The Bronte Fire Brigade answered the call, but was handicapped by lack of water, after i had emptied three large wells. A call was sent for Oakville Brigade, and by linking the hose of the two brigades. line was stretched to Twelve Mile Creek By that time, however, the blaze had a firm hold, and only some of the furniture was saved... The house was owned by E. A. Orr, of Oakville, and was occupied by a hired man.

#### BARN ON BEATTY FARM DESTROYED

Spark from Threshing Outfit Plunges Fine Steel Barn into Mass of Flames, and a Complete Loss

On Wednesday morning the fine steel

There was not even sufficient time to remove the separator and this machine owned by Mr. Harlan Wilson, of Nassagaweya, was lost in the fire. The tractor was backed away from the building and was not damaged. The barn with all the season's crop and some implements, lies a smouldering mass. No live stock was in the barn at the time, as it is always the practise of Mr. Turner, the manager of the farm, to have all the animals out of the building during the threshing operations. ...

This fine steel barn was built about twelve years ago. It was modernly equipped, with the best of steel stanchions and farm equipment, and lighted by electric lights. The steel girders and the frame now lie a heap of twisted metal. The loss is partially covered by insurance and some insurance is carried on the threshing outfit, which was destroyed.

A letter from the Ontario Commission recommended that the local Commission arrange for the proper testing of the grounding of the system. Total expenses for the period \$58,307.10, while revenue was only \$50. 592.94 -an operating deficit of \$7.714.18. Added to this are various amounts for taxes, bond interest and other items which go to make up the larger deficit.
