COCOANUT PUFFS

3 egg whites 21/2 teaspoons cornstarch

1 cup sugar Dash of salt

1 1/2 cups shredded cocoanut 1/2 feaspoon vanilla.

. 4 teaspoon almond extract

Place egg whites in top of double boiler and beat until stiff. -Mix cornstarch with sugar and beat gradually into egg whites Place over hot water and heat about minutes, or until thick around edge Remove from fire. Add salt, cocoanut and flavoring. Drop from teaspoon on greased baking sheet. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees F.) 5 minutes, or until slightly browned. Makes 30 small puffs.


