CONTROL OF MICE IN ORCHARDS


One of the greatest hazards in the danger of girdling by mice. This is especially true in orchards under sod culture, although even orchards under clean cultivation are frequently subject onsiderable damage from this cause. The amount of damage caused by these animals varies greatly from year to year. supply of food. For this reason orchardists are prone to overlook the necessary precautionary measures, which whole orchards may be completely girdled, resulting not only in a heavy finan-

In the orchard at the Experimental Station, Fredericton, N. B., even well grown trees, fifteen years of age, are not immune to severe girling in a bad year. It would thus seem that all trees, grown under a system of sed culture, should be protected until at least fifteen years of age. Several methods of protection may be employed, the one chosen depending upon the permanency of protection desired and the amount of money available.


For young trees, wrapping the trunk with building paper is quite often practised. The material itself is inexpensive but the labor charge is high as it has to be removed in the spring. Wood veneer is also some times used, but has the disadvantage of lacting for only a few years. When all points are considered, it would appear that galvanized wire screen makes the most effective protection. The initial cost is high, but as it only has to be placed once and will last for a large number of years, it will be found cheaper in the long run. This wire should be cut into pieces large enough to encircle the trunk, and leave room for expansion of the trunk, as the tree grows. The lower end should be buried about one inch in the soil, in order to prevent mice from working

Various other methods of protection against mice are being experimented with at the Experimental Station, Fredericton, N. B., but as yet, no method has been found which has given as much satisfaction as the use of galvanized wire


