MISS C. BUMBLY, Bronte The death occurred on Tuesday of Miss Charlotte Bumbly, aged 70, at the home of her sister, Mrs. W. H. Speers, Bronte, with whom she had made her home for some time.

She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Bumbly, pioneer farmers of that district, the old homestead on the Nelson-Trafalgar townline being now in the possession of George Bumbly.

Miss Bumbly is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Speers, Mrs. William Wood of Falkenberg, and Mrs. John Sherwood of Appleby; two brothers, George, on the home farm, and Harris Bumbly, of Burlington; besides numerous nephews and nieces residing in the district.

At Bracebridge Memorial Hospital, on Sunday, October 30, Mr. John McFadden, of Falkenberg, died of pneumonia. He was 63 years of age.

The funeral was held from his late residence on Wednesday, November 2, at 2 o'clock, from the place at Bracebridge. Mr. McFadden was doing township work when taken ill and he was rushed to the hospital there for medical attention, but it was found he had double pneumonia and was beyond human aid.

The late John McFadden lived in Bracebridge for many years, being employed by the Beardmore tannery. Of late years he has been living at Falkenberg. He had many friends in both places who regret his passing.

He was an Honorary Member of L. O. L. No. 218. Mr. McFadden was twice married. Besides his widow he leaves to mourn his loss the following children: Robert, of Port Arthur; Roy, of Stratford; Mrs. Trumbly and Mrs. Freeborn, of Hamilton. He is also survived by three sisters, and two brothers: Mrs. James Gazley, of Toronto; Mrs. Harvey, of Stratford; Mrs. Bell, of Strathville; William McFadden, of Acton; and James McFadden, of Bracebridge.

The pallbearers were Messrs. William and James McFadden, James Gazley, Edward Ball, George Elliott, Ernest Blanchard. The many beautiful floral tributes bespoke of the high esteem in which the deceased was held.

MISS LYDIA E. FORSTER Following an illness of several months' duration, Miss Lydia Elizabeth Forster, a well-known resident of Palmerston, passed away at the home of her brother, Dr. F. J. R. Forster, Waterloo Street, Stratford, on Friday afternoon, October 28. Miss Forster was on a visit to her brother early in the summer and a serious illness set in and she has not been able to return to her home here since that time.

The deceased woman was a daughter of the late Dr. Moffitt Forster, and she was born in Glenwilliams, in Halton County. She had spent the greater part of her life at home and the family had resided in Thornedale, Kitchener, and Palmerston, where Dr. Forster, her brother, had carried on successful practices. When her father retired some twenty-five years ago she went to reside in Toronto, and Miss Forster went to live with him. She resided there until the death of her father, seven years ago, then she took up her residence in Palmerston once more.

Byers, Dr. T. Albert Moore, who conducted the service in Toronto, is a brother-in-law of the deceased. The passing of Miss Forster will be noted with regret, as she was held in high esteem in Palmerston, through many years of residence here.—Palmerston Spectator.
