puzzler to scientists but how fast it blows over a given area has been recorded by the authorities at the Canadian Government Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Records carefully kept throughout the year 1931 show that a total of 38,918 miles of wind passed over the recording point, an average of more than 106 miles The monthly records show that in January 2,316 miles of wind blew over the recording point, in February, 3,670 miles; March, 4,168; April, 4,564; May, 2,958; June, 2,520; July, 1,640; August, 2,660; September, 2,450; October, 3,390; November, 4,000; December, 4,092. It is interesting to note that April was the windlest month, and March, which is usually supposed to hold the record for blustering winds, was in second place with 396 less than April.
