H. Williams, Elizabeth Bay, Ontario; Mrs. R. H. Jewell, Manitowaning, Ontario; Mrs. C. Kemp, Silver Water, Ontario; and Mrs. H. W. Hopkins, Tobermory, Ontario; and four sons, Thos. Rumley, Acton, Ontario; A. M. Rumley, Perth, Ontario; Mr. Joseph Rumley, and Mr. W. J. Rumley, of Silver Water. All were present at the funeral but Mrs. R. D. Hopkins and Mrs. H. Hopkins, who were unable to attend through illness. There are also three sons and one daughter dead. There were five generations living. Variety of News

C. N. R. Water Tank Being Removed. Workmen have been tearing down the old water tank at the C.N.R. station the past week and this landmark will soon be removed. It was erected when the present station was built about twenty-five years or so ago, and has done service in filling the locomotive here since that time. A new type of locomotive now in use does not require filling at so many points and the C.N.R. is doing away with these tanks. It will mean the loss of over \$700 per year to the local waterworks plant when the present contract expires. The removal of the tank is making quite an altered appearance about the station premises. Over 38,000 Miles of Wind. Where does the wind go, may still be a puzzle to scientists but how fast it blows over a given area has been recorded by the authorities at the Canadian Government Experimental Farm, Ottawa. Records carefully kept throughout the year 1931 show that a total of 38,918 miles of wind passed over the recording point, an average of more than 106 miles per day, or less than 4 1/2 miles per hour. The monthly records show that in January 2,318 miles of wind blew over the recording point, in February, 3,670 miles; March, 4,168; April, 4,564; May, 2,958; June, 2,520; July, 1,640; August, 2,660; September, 2,450; October, 3,390; November, 4,000; December, 4,892. It is interesting to note that April was the windiest month, and March, which is usually supposed to hold the record for blustering winds, was in second place with 396 less than April. Third place went to December. BACK TO THE CHURCH. According to statistics, the churches in the United States gained less than 90,000 members during 1930, but in 1931 the membership increased 433,656. Among Protestant denominations the Baptists have boasted of the largest membership for some time. A gain of over 139,000 brings their present total membership to between nine and ten million, while the Methodists have slightly over 8,000,000 members, with a gain of approximately 46,000 for 1931. Other gains for 1931 are: Lutherans, 49,000; Presbyterians, 16,500; Protestant Episcopal, 7,000; and Catholic, 15,000. The Disciples of Christ and the Congregationalist-Christian Churches showed a slight loss.

Five years ago, Jack McDermid, of Georgetown, was Member for the Seventh Ontario Older Boys' Parliament. The next two years Acton had the honor, through J. Elvin Gamble and Wm. Wilson. For the last two years, Milton boys, Harold Mark and the present member, Jack Rush, have represented Halton County. A group of eight young men from Georgetown visited Acton Sunday schools on Sunday and spoke in the interests of Fraser Mims.
