Chocolate Marshmallow Surprise 1 package chocolate junket powder

- 1 pint milk
- 1 cup confectioners' sugar
- 14 pound marshmallows

Prepare chocolate junket according to directions on package. Chill in refrigerator. Cut marshmallows in pieces and melt in double boiler. Dissolve sugar in bolling water, add to marshmallows, and stir until thoroughly blended. Turn into a bowl and cool. Just before serving, put topping on cold raspberry junket.

Lemon Junket with Baked Apples

- 1 junket tablet 1 tablespoon cold water
- 1 pint milk 3 tablespoons sugar
- 6 apples Maraschino cherries
- teaspoon lemon flavoring 1 cup sugar
- 15 cup water
