MINER ITHW SET OF OLD SCHOOL BOOKS

During the past few years Mr. Henry Ford, the Detroit auto magnate, and Jack Miner, the Canadian Naturalist have become very intimate and close friends. During recent years Mr. Ford has spent many an evening with Jack Miner in his humble home at Kingsville bird sactuary, and usually the conversation is all about their boyhood days when ther went to school or when they used to attend the old-fashioned square

One evening last spring they were discussing their old school books, and although Jack Miner never went to school but three months in his life, yet Henry Ford, being only a year or so clder than Jack Miner, it was soon found that they had both studied out of the McGuffey readers. They both agreed that they would like to see a set of these old school books; so upon Mr. Ford's return to Detroit he had his secretaries locate for him, in some museum, a copy of each issue of the old McGuffey readers. SCIENTISTS AND A DESPISED

natural relative of gypsum, found extensively in some parts of Canada, may soon become a much more valuable asset than has hitherto been regarded. some time scientists of the Canadian Government Department of Mines have been making intensive experiments with anyhydrite, with encouraging results. The research work has been directed largely toward ascertaining how to use anhydrite in the manufacture of commercial plasters, and now plasters from this mineral have been produced, which it is disclosed following a series of exacting tests, compare favorably both in setting qualities, tensile strength and other factors with the better grades of gypsum plasters; in fact the experiments so far made show the anhydrite plasters have greater density than those of gypsum, that they are easily worked, are strong and do not require calcination. So it comes about that the scientists have discovered that an incidental mineral regarded with disfavor by gypsum operators largely because of the expense involved in sorting it from the gypsum, on which it acts as an adulter-
