JESUS FORGIVENG SIN Golden Text.-The Son of man hath authority on earth to forgive sins. Mark

Lesson Text. Mk. 2 1-12. Study also, s. 32: Lu. 15: 11-24.

Time.-May (or June), A. D. 28. Place. -Capernaum: 6

Exposition. - I. Jesus Teaching the Ignorant, I, 2.

Jesus had left Capernaum and the crowds that were gathering to Him there to preach in the town lying near (ch. 1: 37, 38). The excitement over His marvelous powers became so great that He was forced to leave the cities for a quieter and more substantial ministry in sparsely settled country districts (ch. 1: 45). But at once the report went far and wide that He was at home. The presence of Jesus always draws a crowd (v. 13; 1: 33, 45; 4: 1, 2; Lu. 12:1). As soon as it is known that Jesus is really in any church or home, the people will come. The crowd came partly from curiosity largely for healing, but Jesus gave them first that which was far more important than healing for their bodies. He gave them "the word" for their perishing souls. 
