Exports of Canned Tomatoes and Fruits Canned tomatoes exported from Canada in 1932 amounted to 13,238,203 pounds, an increase of 6,823,813 pounds over the 1931 exports.

Canada's Leading Flying Club The distinction of operating the largest of the 25 flying clubs in Canada goes to Edmonton, Alberta. At the annual meeting held recently it was shown that in 1932 a total of 24 private pilots' licenses and five commercial licenses were won by members, which was one-twelfth of all the licenses issued in the Dominion to similar clubs during the year.

Canadian Flowers for Flanders Those who may later be visiting the battlefields of France and Belgium from Canada and other parts of North America may recognize among the wealth of flowers blooming over the graves in British cemeteries, in which Canadians are buried, some that are peculiarly and particularly indigenous to Canada and other parts of the North American Continent.

Fatal Accident at Nelson Village Carlyle Graham-Brown, young Toronto business man, met instant death on the Dundas Highway, a mile east of Nelson Village, at 2 o'clock Saturday morning, when his auto crashed across a ditch, through a fence, and made several somersaults before coming to a stop in a field.

Second Largest Gold Field Gold produced in the year 1932 from the mines in Northern Ontario was valued at \$46,773,154, an increase of \$4,035,878 over the value of 1931.

THIS WAS 1932 IN CANADA

Purchasing power decreased by 22.14 per cent. from 1931, according to an estimate by the Financial Post Business Year Book. Industrial production decreased 11.4 per cent., and the physical volume of business declined by 10 per cent. in the first 10 months of 1932.

Imports of key products in the first ten months of 1932 declined in volume as follows: Rubber, 14.8 per cent.; coal, 13.7 per cent.; petroleum, 6.6 per cent.; and automobiles, 8.5 per cent.

Electric power output for ten months was 13.3 per cent. below a year ago. Construction permits were 63.7 per cent. less than a year ago in the first 11 months.

Bank debits in the first ten months were 18.4 per cent. lower than in the same period of 1931. Insurance sales for the first 11 months of 1932 were 16.2 per cent. lower than in the same period of 1931.
