For the past seven years an experinent has been conducted by the Bee Division of the Dominion Experimental Farms to test the validity of certain claims made for large hives. Three groups of eight colonies each and housed in three different sizes of hives have been maintained on a commercial basis for the full period mentioned, and the results obtained to date would indicate that the question of size in hives is more a matter bees in a small hive can, with the proper management, be made to yield just as good crops as one in a large hive, and furthermore, swarm control and wintering can also be achieved just as efficiently in one as in the other with proper and careful manipulation. The smaller ten-framed "Langstroth hive," however, has one advantage over the larger hives, namely, it is the hive most generally used, and its supers are of the same size as the hive body and are, therefore, interchangeable, which permits of great flex-


