At the Dominion Experimental Farm, Nappan, N. S., all feeds are charged against the hog at market or cost of production prices. For example, roots are charged at present at \$3.30 per ton, oats at \$23 per ton, and barley at \$25.80. the cost of production in 1932.

During the past four years a total of 121 hogs have been carried through on Lamb: "A laugh is worth a hundred the Advanced Registry tests. The rations groans in any market." have been very similar for all lots. The weights of each hog are recorded every thirty days; also feeds consumed. From these data information has been secured regarding the gains and feed consumption per pound gain for each period from weaning to finishing. The feed consumption for these 121 hogs was found to be 3.19 pounds meal per pound gain, while from weaning (45 days of age) to finishing (195 days of age) the daily gain was 1.252 pounds, costing .4.89 cents per pound. In other words, allowing the pigat weaning (weighing 22 pounds) a value of \$1.50, the total cost of a 210 pound hog would be \$10.70. While at the present time the market value of pork does not cover the total cost of a hog to finishing, when all feeds are charged at market or cost of production prices, the hog on the average farm is a side-line. turning into human food many waste products otherwise unmarketable. From this angle, it serves as a cash product and will give fair labor returns under average conditions providing, first, the bulk of the feeds is home-grown and second, that the hog is of the best type obtainable and is properly grown and dedicated to God. finished. It should be born in mind that the prices charged for home-grown feeds include rent of land, use of machinery and all labor and other charges against that particular crop.

Demonstrating the value of proper type and finish, the premium for "select" hogs at the present time amounts to 12.5 per cent. of the value of a "bacon" hogs, while the penalty on a "butcher" hogs is the same amount, or a difference between a "select" and a "butcher" of approximately \$2.00 or 25 per cent. of the market value of "bacons."

The price of breeding stock is correspondingly low and it behooves every farmer to seriously consider the question of improving his breeding stock to as high a degree as possible by the selecting of sires from Advanced Registry ancestry. At present reasonable returns can be made only on the best individuals properly fed. When market conditions altogether. improve, greater returns will result from having the right type of foundation stock.

# Items of News

It is evident from a report just issued by the Canadian Government Bureau of Statistics on the ice cream production in Canada for 1931 that Canadians have an appetite for ice oream. The total consumption in the year under review was 6,234,272 gallons, an increase of 2,783,138 gallons, compared with the total production in 1921. The 1931 production was valued at \$11,161,595. The Canadian Government Bureau of Statistics states that ice cream is an article of food. It possesses all the elements of a real food, being easily disgested, palatable and highly nutritive. The production of ice cream in the Dominion is carried on chiefly by the dairy and confeotionery industries. The per capita consumption of ice cream according to the latest figures is .79 gallons. The provinces showing the highest per capita consumption were Ontario, British Columbia and Nova Scotia, with 1.09, .89 and .87 gallons respectively.

County Grant
