## Town Hall Rental Reduced Council Passed Auditors' Report

**H. N. Farmer Appointed Member of the Free Library Board by Council—Boys Warned Against Riding Bicycles on Sidewalks and Use of Catepats—Council Does Not Favor Radio Broadcast—Municipal Officers to Use Town's Lawn Mower at School Grounds if Grounds Are Properly Prepared.**

At the meeting of the Council, on Monday evening, Councilors W. A. Lasby, E. Jones, J. McMillan and S. M. Lasby were present, and Reeve E. T. Thetford presided.

The eighth report of the Finance Committee recommended payment of the following accounts:

The report was adopted.

The School Board requested the use of the town lawn mower at the school grounds. The power mower they had was out of order. It was pointed out that the town machine had been kept in good condition by the Municipal Officers for three years without repairs. It was felt also that the grounds at the school were not in condition for a mower, and it could be used only by the Municipal Officer since he was responsible for the care of the machine. The Council was agreed to allowing use of the machine if the grounds were put in condition.

A letter from the Globe Indemnity Co. was received, regarding the accident when Mrs. Mcintosh tripped over a pipe used for filling tanks on Mill Street. The Company was prepared to look after the case.

It was decided to have the water services at the arena discontinued for the summer months.

A representative from broadcasting station CKCL had requested, through the Reeve, assistance for a broadcast boosting Acton. The fee was \$15 for a ten weeks broadcast, one day each week. It was felt that in view of the change in this station by reduced power, such a broadcast would be useless, and not even audible in Acton.

Mr. Earl Lambert requested that the water be drained from Mill Street rather than being allowed to flow over his property. It was agreed to attend to the matter and deepen the ditch along this property.

Harrop Bros. requested use of the Town Hall for a dance on Saturday night. They felt that the previous rental charge was too high and the Council felt that the rate had been set when prices were higher, and a reduction should be made.

Moved by S. M. Lasby, seconded by W. A. Lasby, that the rental to be charged for the Town Hall for dances or other forms of entertainment shall in future be seven dollars per night, up to midnight, and one dollar extra for every hour of traction of an hour after midnight.—Carried.

The matter of the transfer of the arena account to the General Account of the town was opened for discussion again, and this was left over for consideration at a future meeting.

The question of appointing a member for the Council to the Free Library Board was discussed.

Moved by J. McMillan, seconded by S. M. Lasby, that Mr. H. N. Farmer be appointed as the Council's member of the Library Board.—Carried.

A letter from the Town of Lindsay requested that the Council endorse a proposal for the unemployed to be put to work cutting wood on the Crown Lands. No action was taken on this question.

Council agreed to a rebate of 40c on J. B. Watson's taxes, which had been overcharged.

The Clerk was instructed to insert a notice in the Free Press warning against riding bicycles on the sidewalks and the use of catepats by boys.

The destruction and removal of the backstop on the baseball diamond at the Park was called to the attention of the Council. The booth was also to be returned to its site.

The Auditor's Report was thoroughly studied by the Council. The auditors complimented the officials on the condition of the municipal books.

Moved by E. Jones, seconded by W. A. Lasby, that the Auditors' Report for 1932 as presented be adopted and that the Clerk be instructed to have printed the usual number of copies and that a vote of thanks and appreciation be extended to the auditors for their work.—Carried.

The matter of dispensing with the services of the night watchman or reducing the salary was considered by the Council, and a committee of Councilors Jones and S. M. Lasby appointed to report at the next meeting.

—Acton Creamery will be closed as usual on Good Friday.

### Cattle Shipments Active

There's a fair quantity these days of what may be regarded as the "roast beef of Old England" being served to the British people in their own country but which a short time before was prime young steer in Canada. The shipments of live cattle from the Dominion to the British market are particularly active this year. From January 1 to March 23, 1933, a total of 7,863 head were exported from Canada to British ports, an increase of 7,454, compared with the corresponding period of 1932. With the opening of navigation on the St. Lawrence it is expected there will be heavy shipments from Montreal to fill large orders already received from buyers in Britain.

### May Disfranchise Delinquent Tax Payers

Disfranchisement of all taxpayers who are three years or more in arrears of taxes was moved at a meeting of the Trafalgar Township Council on Monday. A by-law to this effect will be brought down at the next meeting of Council. Legal advice will be sought in the matter. An ever-increasing number of tax defaulters is responsible for the move, which is designed to hasten collections and strengthen the township's financial position. The sum of \$5,004 was the township's share of direct relief paid '09 during the winter months, according to a report presented by the Welfare Board. Council have ordered that the Board be disbanded on the first of May.
