Well-Known Hockey Player Died
Local hockey players and friends who journeyed to Bracebridge this year with the Acton team were shocked to learn of the death of Bala of Bill Braybrook. This young man, twenty-four years of age, was the outstanding player on the Bracebridge team for the past three seasons. The Bracebridge Gazette characterized him as one of the best hockey players Muskoka ever produced. He was taken ill with the flu on Friday and passed away the following Wednesday.

No Criminal Cases in Halton
Halton County Spring Assizes opened at the court house, Milton Monday afternoon, before the Hon. Justice McEvoy. Changes in Hockey Rules
Far reaching changes in the rules of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, with an object of speeding up the game and giving greater leniency to the association of amateurs with professionals will be in effect next season throughout Canada as a result of action taken at the 18th Annual Meeting of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, which concluded in Vancouver on Monday. The forward pass in amateur hockey was legalized with unanimous consent of assembled delegates. The change was made from the former rule which made forward passing illegal by an attacking team in defending territory. The Association broke away from its former stand against amateurs mixing with professionals. Amateur players who desire to try for professional teams will be allowed to do so provided they observe the laws of amateurism while doing so. If unsuccessful they will retain their amateur ranking.

22 FEWER SEATS

In the Ontario Legislature — Halton County Will Remain Unchanged by the Redistribution

A reduction of 22 seats in the present Legislature membership of 112—that is down to the 90 seats forecast by Premier Henry in public announcements as early as last December—has been recommended to the House by the Special Redistribution Committee, under the chairmanship of Hon. William Finlayson, Minister of Lands and Forests.

The schedule setting out this redistribution with attendant changes in riding boundaries was tabled in the House when Mr. Finlayson presented his report. The boundaries, however, will not be made public until such time as the schedule is printed and released for distribution among the members.

In a statement to the press, Mr. Finlayson pointed out that the redistribution recommended had been based on a minimum population of 25,000 for a rural riding; and of 50,000 for an urban riding. Effort had been made, he said, to keep to county boundaries where possible. Most of the work of the committee was done, it appears, by a sub-committee comprising Hon. Leopold Macaulay, Minister of Highways, representing the Conservative party; Dr. George A. McQuibban, representing the Liberals; and D. J. Taylor, representing the Progressives.

After two meetings, Mr. Finlayson states, this sub-committee was able to present the schedule which has been adopted unanimously by the main committee and which now is formally and finally before the House proper for endorsement. The schedule follows:
