Brampton Milk to be Pasteurized

In spite of determined opposition by Deputy Reeve W. A. Russell, who claimed that the bill was a discrimination against the smaller dealers, Brampton's milk by-law was amended at Tuesday night's regular session of Town Council. Milk and cream sold in the town must be pasteurized, or produced by tuberculois-free herds.

Mr. Albertson was clerk for seventeen years, during which time he gave faithful attention to all the arduous duties of the office. Pumphouse and Pipe Line from Spring to Reservoir to be Renovated and Improved

At the meeting of the Public Utilities Commission on Monday afternoon, Commissioners E. J. Kerr, L. G. King and Reeve Theford were present. Arrangements were made for securing additional help on the Hydro and water-works usually undertaken during the season, and the work outlined by the Superintendent, which is necessary to maintain the system.

Through Commissioner King a request was made for a reduction in the water service at the Bowling and Tennis Club grounds. It was requested that the pipe line and supply be reduced at this service. It was agreed to apply a smaller metre if the Company would make the necessary fittings preparatory to putting in the smaller service.

The repairs at the pump house at the spring works to be undertaken. It was felt advisable to construct a new covered course for the water from the spring to the pump house and possibly the screens will require replacing. The brickwork also needs repairs and pointing. The Commission agreed to visit the property the following morning and outline the work that was deemed necessary.

Hydro Pays \$200 Damages in Streetsville Case

Claiming that Streetsville did not have the right to sell electric power to Toronto Township users, because there had never been a vote of township ratepayers on the question, the Ontario Hydro Power Commission agreed to pay \$200 damages to the village for cutting lines to consumers outside the village. Last year the Commission took over several services on the edge of the village, cutting the Streetsville lines. Later it was learned that the village had a franchise to supply outside consumers in the township. The report was given as final by Gordon B. Jackson, village solicitor.

Guelph Reformatory Inmates Escape

Squeezing through a small aperture in the ceiling of a cell, W. French-Canadian inmates, made their escape from the "tower" of the Ontario Reformatory at an early hour Sunday morning. Under cover of darkness, the two prisoners ripped the heavy wire screening from one of the windows. After freeing themselves from the cell, they dropped a considerable distance to a roof, and made a further drop of 18 feet to the ground below. Thebaudouin, sentenced in Hamilton, was serving 12 months definite and 24 months indeterminate for assaulting a peace officer. Mincee, who came from St. Thomas, was serving 18 months definite and 24 months indeterminate for house-breaking, and theft. They were scantily clothed and lacked shoes, but are believed to have been wearing slippers.

HALTON COUNTY MUSICAL FESTIVAL

Judging Will Take Place on Saturday, May 6 and Friday, May 12—Acton School Has Entries in Sixteen Classes

There is much activity these days about the schools in preparation for the County Musical Festival. The first events in the schedule this year will be held on Saturday morning. The Festival has grown to such proportions that it is now necessary to conduct it on two days.

The entries and events for Saturday, May 6, are as follows: Commencing at nine o'clock, Rural Choirs, 1 room, 8 entries; piano solos, 9 years and under, with 12 entries; rural solos, girls, 7 years and under, 7 entries; rural solos, boys, 7 years and under, 7 entries; rural solos, girls, 10 years and under, 11 entries; rural solos, boys, 10 years and under, 5 entries; rural solos, girls, 14 years and under, 7 entries; rural solos, boys, 14 years and under, 3 entries.

The afternoon judging on the first day commences at one o'clock, with the piano solos for 12 years and under, 20 entries; Junior choir, 8 entries; and 18 entries in each class for urban solos for boys and girls, under 7 years, and 10 years.

The following Friday, May 12, will see the other events started at nine o'clock for girls' open solo; 5 entries for boys, open solo; 10 entries for boys' duets; and 12 entries for girls' duets.

The first item on Friday afternoon is the girls' double trio, with seven entries; followed by twenty-five voice choirs, for 2 to 4 room schools, with 4 entries; urban solo, for boys 14 years and under, 10 entries; sixty-voice choir, three-part, with 3 entries; 15 voice boys' choir, for 1 to 4 rooms, has 4 entries; piano solos, 15 years and under, 2 entries; 40-voice urban choir, two part, 4 entries; boys' choir, 35 voices, unison, 3 entries; urban solos, girls, 14 years and under, 13 entries.

In the evening of Friday, May 12, the winner of first place in each event will furnish the programme for a concert, over which Mr. P. W. Cooke, President of the County organization, will preside. Inspector J. M. Denyes will present the prizes which will include silver cups and shields and gold and silver medals. The Festival and concert will be held in St. Paul's United Church, Milton. Mr. Peter C. Kennedy, of Toronto, is the adjudicator.
