### FARM LIVESTOCK IN CANADA

An increase of over half a million head in the number of cattle on farms is recorded in a report on livestock in Canada for 1932 just issued by the Canadian Government Bureau of Statistics. The number of sheep increased slightly over the previous year while horses and swine were in slightly fewer numbers than in 1931. Values of all stock were below the previous year.

The estimate for 1932 in respect to cattle is that the Dominion had 6,511,100 head compared with 7,991,000 head in the previous year. The horse population is placed at 3,088,630 against 3,328,096 in 1931; sheep, 2,644,500 against 2,608,000; and swine 4,639,100 as against 4,716,720 in the preceding year.

The total value of this farm livestock for 1932 is estimated at \$375,722,000. All descriptions of farm poultry are valued at a total of \$34,738,000 for 1932. The number of turkeys increased and there were also increases in geese and ducks in Canada, but the total for heirs and chickens declined.

On light sandy loams, potash is an important element of plant food for the corn crop, and, unless the land is heavily manured, the application of a complete fertilizer having a fairly high content of potash may be desirable.

One of the newer things in agriculture is the specialized turkey farm.

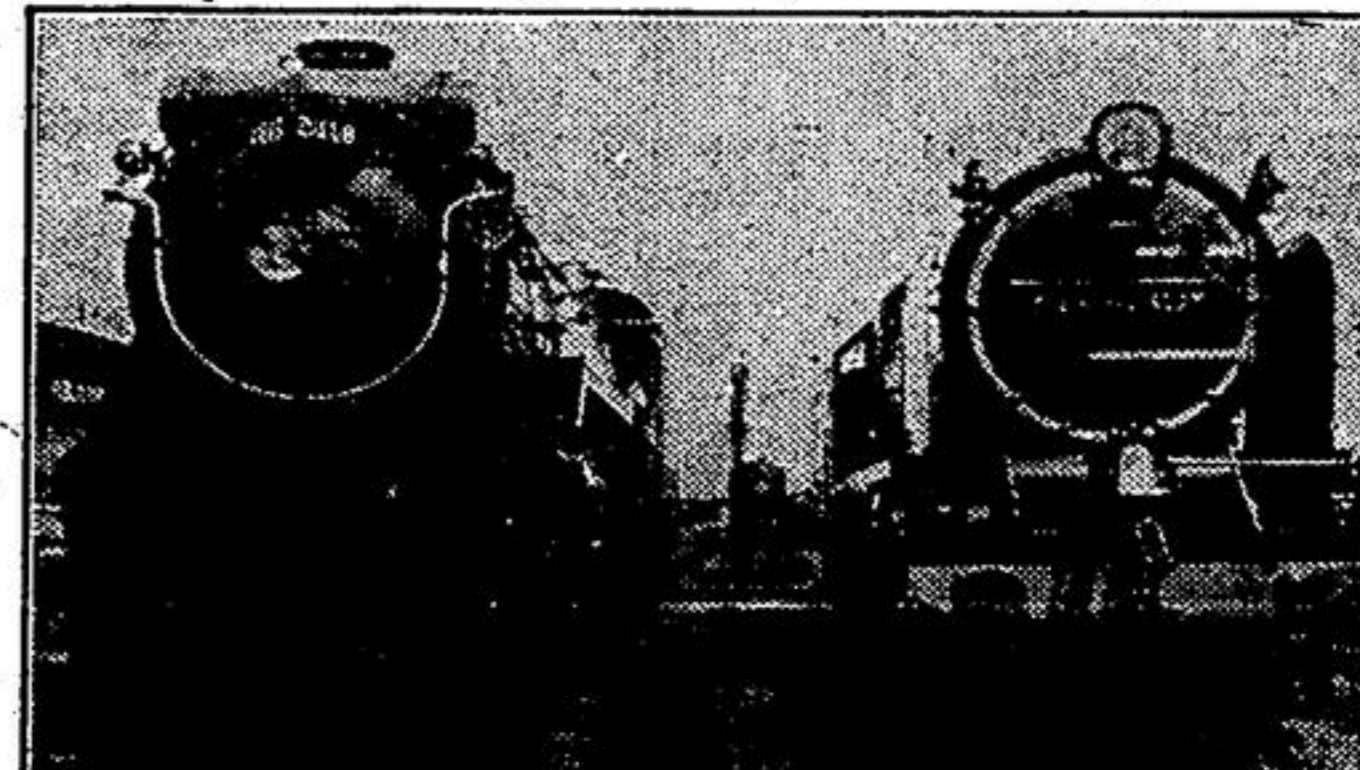
Moved by L. L. Mullin, seconded by N. A. Robinson, that the Treasurer pay John Crawshaw five dollars for postage and exchange.—Carried.

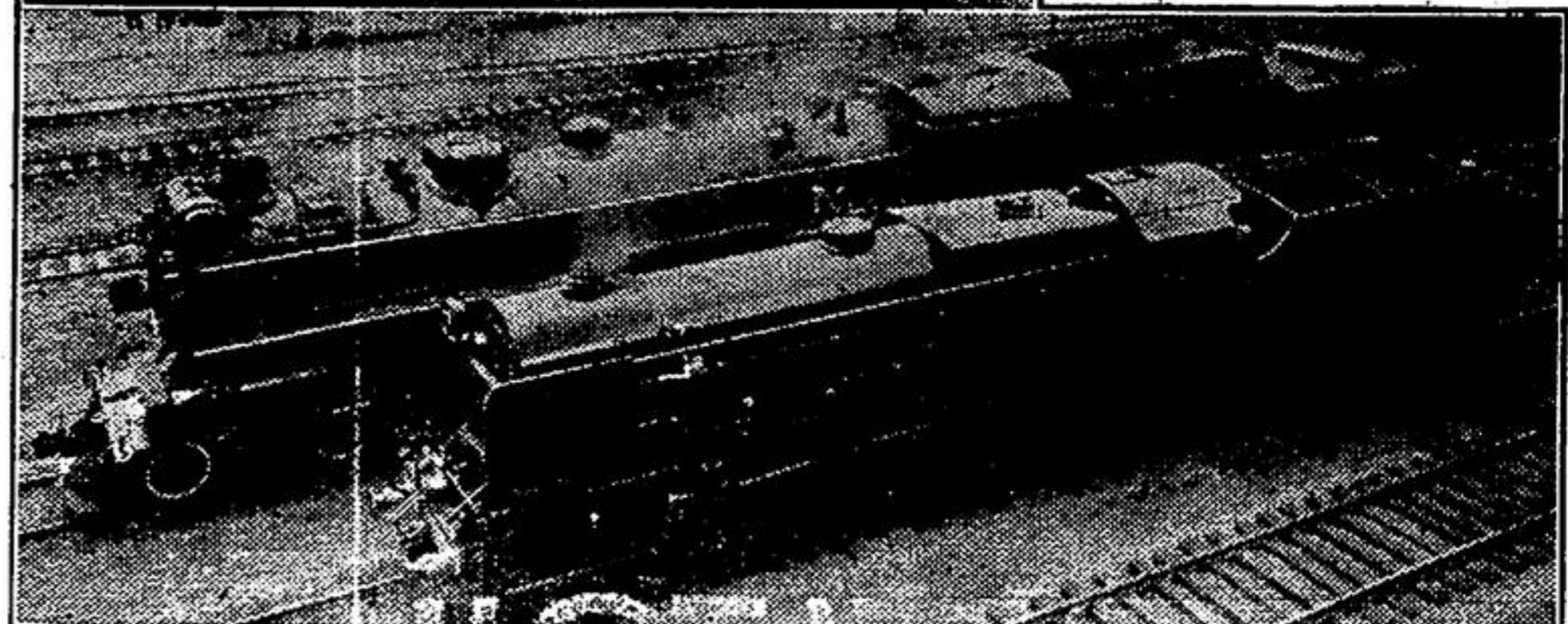
### PART OF YOUR EQUIPMENT
