It will be recalled that Acton's rate did not climb into the fifty odd mills levy of many other centres and therefore large millage cuts cannot be announced now. Savings have been made in many instances by public bodies, but these have largely been absorbed by the reduction of the usual provincial grants It is not good business to neglect maintenance and proper repairs of municipal property. 
