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MRS. JOHN G. BLACKLOCK
One of the oldest residents of Campbellville passed away on Sunday, June 25, when the death of Mrs. John Blacklock occurred at her residence there. She had spent all her life in Nassagaweya Township and the last twelve years in Campbellville. Her husband, the late John G. Blacklock, passed away in March, 1929. In 1925 the esteemed couple had celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. Mrs. Blacklock was, before her marriage, Ann Jane McCurdy, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. McCurdy, who was in her eighty-third year. Of the family of twelve children that came to bless the home, eleven remain to revere the memory of this devoted mother. They are: William, of Brookville; Thomas, of Hamilton; George, John and Harvey, of Campbellville; James, of Guelph; Norman, of Trenton; Mrs. John Black, Acton; Mrs. B. Cope, Ancaster; Mrs. A. McKinnon, Moffat; and Mrs. Chas. Twist, Kilmorie. One daughter, May, died nine years ago. One sister, Mrs. Stokes, of Belleville, was a member. Mrs. Blacklock was a member of St. John's Anglican Church, Nassagaweya, and prided highly her church affiliations. The hospitality of her home was known to all and the old friends who liked to visit her there will miss her from her place, as well as the members of the family. The funeral was held on Tuesday afternoon of last week, and was conducted by her pastor, Rev. Mr. Weaver, assisted by Rev. C. G. Jones, of Campbellville; and Rev. Mr. Andrews, of Beamsville, a former pastor. At the service, held in St. John's Church, all paid high tribute to her life. The pallbearers were Messrs. Thos. Moore, Chas. McPhail, John Gilmore, Wm. 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The trees should be sprayed about the middle of June, or earlier, with lime sulphur at the rate of four pounds to 70 gallons of water. Although thorough spraying is necessary, the trees should not be drenched. The deposit left on the foliage by the spray disappears within a few weeks.
