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attack. They were agreed to wipe out Section 88 of the Criminal Code of Canada. He quoted at length and in detail from the Canadian Annual Review of 1919 concerning the Winnipeg strike.

"On one particular point," he declared, "I would just like to say a few words to the church to which I belong supported the principles of the C. C. F. Miller Phillips does not understand English very well or he deliberately tries to misrepresent what the Pope has stated in his encyclical." Mr. McCrea also read in detail from the Catholic encyclical regarding the church's stand on public and private ownership.

Mr. McCrea defended Premier Henry. He was able, competent and a thoroughly honest man as Premier. He knew his work and there wasn't a crooked hair in George Henry's head. The Conservative leadership was safe in his hands, because he was an honest man. The Abitibi Canyon power transaction was good business for the Province of Ontario. It was one of the best deals ever made, and will redound to the credit of George Henry. The Minister also read the findings of the Commission enquiring into the Aird payments and the Madawaska deal, to show that they, too, had been correct and good business for Ontario.

In concluding his address, Mr. McCrea warned the public not to be taken in by all the gophers and vague promises of the opposition. The Conservative government, he said, had given Ontario clean, honest administration, and could

be depended on to go on creating greater progress at all times. He said the people knew where it stood.
