Campbell, of Winnipeg, to commemorate the century of Mrs. Campbell's parents—the late Anson Buck, M. D., M. R. C. S (Eng.), August 17, 1833 to 1919, and of his wife, Keturah Adelaide Howell, March 10, 1832-1906, and also to commemorate the coming to Canada, in 1777 of those United Empire Loyalists, who were ancestors of the Buck family.
