OLD HAT AS MEMORIAL. By the side of the road which winds up from Comara, in the back blocks of New South Wales, hangs the strangest of memorials. It is an old felt hat.

Burke was driving a cart along the cutting by the precipitous bank when some unknown cause frightened the horse, it bolted; and horse, cart and driver went over the side. The cart was smashed to splinters far below. The horse, strangely enough, was found half-way down the bank unhurt. But the driver was killed.

Erin Barn Destroyed. Fire of mysterious origin completely destroyed a barn and an entire season's crop on the farm of Archie Sinclair, first line of Erin Township, about 3.30 o'clock Tuesday morning. Jim VanNorman, of Erin Township, saw flames on the roof of the barn, and rushed to the scene, but although he summoned help immediately, it was too late to subdue the flames, which by this time had enveloped the barn.

There was no stock in the barn but the whole season's crop was stored. About five o'clock in the afternoon, a horse which is usually stabled in the structure was taken to the bush by a member of the family, and had been left there for the night. Some implements were also destroyed in the flames. Residents point out that the origin of the fire is rendered more mysterious through the fact that spontaneous combustion rarely occurs at this time of the year. No one had been working in the barn with a light during the evening, and all concerned are utterly at a loss to account for the fire.

RALLY DAY
