# Ninth Anniversary Service of the United Church last Sunday

Large Congregations Attended Both Morning and Evening Services-Rev. Chas. D. Draper, of Beamsville, the Minister for the Occasion - Anniversary Offering Was Met with Liberal Response by Congregation.

Splendid congregations joined in the ninth Anniversary Services of the United Church here on Sunday, and the edifice had large audiences at both the morning and evening services. At the evening service the congregations of both the Baptist and Presbyterian Churches joined for the anniversary, with the services in these churches withdrawn. Rev. Mr. Gifford attended and took part in the eervice.

The minister for this anniversary occasion was Rev. Chas. D. Draper, of Beamsville, a former pastor of the church here, who is highly esteemed. In his opening remarks at the evening service he spoke of the joy it gave him to visit Acton again. Many faces prominent in the church and community when he lived here were missing now. They had done well their work in the upbuilding of both church and town.

The morning sermon was the application of the mind of Jesus to our modern questions of the social and economic life. In introducing his theme. Mr. Draper quoted some extracts from the press, relative to the United Church and its relation to these questions, which suggested that the church of to-day was on the wrong track when it entered into the discussion of these topics of material interest. He stated that he was very glad that the United Church was worthy of criticism, which was ample evidence that it was striking a vital chord in the nation's life. In the face of this criticism he chose as his theme. "Is the United Church off track?" and found his text in Paul's letter to the Philippians 2: 5: "Let this mind be in you which

The new paper will be known "The Conservator, with which Amalgamated the Banner and Times.
