DIETARY OF WILD FOWL DISAPPEARING IN EAST
 The disappearance of eel grass from the Atlantic coast of Canada and the United States and along the shores of the Gulf of St. Lawrence coincides with continued destruction of the eel grass on the coast of European countries, states the Natural Resources Department of the Canadian National Railways. The situation is causing concern because eel grass, takes an important place in the dietary of the Canada wild goose and brant, and has already resulted in fewer of these wild fowl being seen on the northern shore of the St. Lawrence. Industry which uses eel grass as insulating material is also being affected. This year not a single ton could be harvested from the St. Lawrence shore in the Isle Verte vicinity where normally hundreds of tons are obtained annually.
