Learn to serve jellied salads for dinner -if you have not already started this modern practice. They seem to touch the proverbial spot while the fruits or vegetables contained in these salads furnish excellent balancers to the heavy meat or fowl dishes:

CRANBERRY MOLD

- 1 package lemon-flavored gelatin 114 cups boiling water
- Juice 1/2 lemon
- 14 cup celery, finely cut % cup canned shredded pines
- 1 cup thick cranberry sauce. sweetened

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Chill. When slightly thickened, add lemon fulce, celery, pineapple, and cranberry sauce. Turn into mold. Chill until firm. Garnish with mayonnaise. Serves 6.

YEAR-ROUND SALAD

- 1 package lemon or lime-flavored gelating 1 pint boiling water
- 2 tablespoons vinegar 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 cup cabbage, finely shredded
- 1 cup celery, finely cut 1 pimento, finely cut
- 1 tablespoon green pepper, finely chop-


