REED CANARY GRASS

How many Canadian farmers are amiliar with Reed Canary Grass? is safe to say that the majority have never heard of it, although a few men have grown it for several years. As matter of fact it may be found growing wild in many places from coast to coast Reed Canary Grass is a tall growing perennial plant which is most at home in moist locations. Curiously enough it is also very drought resistant, remaining green through hot summer weather on soil which is very dry. It is not nearly so productive, however, as when moisture

conditions are favorable. The Division of Forage Plants, Dominion Experimental Farm, has conducted experiments with Reed Canary Grass for many years. These tests have shown that it is a valuable grass to grow on land which becomes flooded with water for a time each season. Once Reed Canary Grass is established it will last for many years. It spreads by underground stems and forms a good sod, but may be eradicated if one desires to

Reed Canary Grass should be cut for hay about the time that the heads appear. Live stock like it and it has good feeding value. As a pasture grass it is very palatable and nutritious. Most of the seed supply at present is produced in Minnesota on peat land. The grass is well adapted to this kind of soil. Seed production of Reed Canary Grass is a little difficult because the seed shatters readily, making it necessary to harvest at exactly the right time. This is one reason why seed prices have been high. The seed has a smooth oily appearance, reminding one of flax. It is attractive in appearance, easy to handle, and weighs about 30 pounds per bushel.
