ing this term of office. The debenture debt of Acton was being reduced nicely and the municipality was heading for a very happy position. He gave his ideas concerning the Murray Memorial project. The school ground, he felt, was not a convenient location for this building, and the Town Hall was alright as it was.

Councillor W. A. Lasby, after thanking those who had placed him in nomination, expressed the pleasure he felt at the good financial sheet that could be shown this year. The town's debt had been reduced by \$10,000.

Several of the nominees for various offices were not present but all were given an opportunity to address the meeting. G. A. Dills thanked those who had placed his name in nomination but was undecided whether he would contest the office.

George Cowie gave his appreciation to those who placed his name in nomination. He enjoyed the Council work but would not be a candidate this year. He would like to see the old Council re-elected.
