## Various Interesting Items of News

**Produced 13,545 lbs. of Milk**  
A four-year-old Holstein-belted, Limerick Allida, bred and owned by A. G. M. Brown, Limerick, has just closed her last lactation period in the 365 day division of the Canadian Record of Performance with a total production of 13,545 lbs. milk, containing 608.25 lbs. butter.

**Two Erin People Injured**  
Hugh McKenzie suffered serious bruises and lacerations, and his wife suffered a severely twisted knee, along with lacerations, when the motor car in which they were driving went out of control on a side road north of Erin Village, and upset over a culvert. Dr. C. Scott had the injured people removed to their home at Erin. The car was a complete wreck.

**Bible Story to be Dramatized**  
Next Sunday evening, six young men of the church will dramatize the Bible story of "Joseph the Dreamer," as part of the evening service of the United Church. These stories portrayed by the young people have proven very impressive and pleasant and this story on Sunday evening tells of that well-known incident when Joseph went to visit his brothers at Colesh.

**On Tuesday evening Acton I. O. O. F.** gave a supper, dance and entertainment in the Parish Hall which proved a delightful function. There was a good attendance. On behalf of the officers of the lodge Mr. E. Coles, N. G., welcomed all and the following varied and pleasing programme was presented over by: Mrs. A. Mason, vocal trio by Misses E. Schwegel, V. B. Rumley and J. Smith; readings by Miss Jessie Rawlings; solos by Mr. Ernie Coles; cornet solos by Mr. Chas. Landborough; piano duets by Mrs. Warden and Miss Velma Blair; musical number by Mr. L. Locker. The accompanists were Mrs. L. Warden, Miss J. Young, Miss Brown and Mr. Chas. Landborough. Following the programme an appetizing lunch was served, when an eight-piece orchestra provided music. A dance followed with an orchestra of local musicians providing the rhythm.

**Mayor Robson Again Elected in Guelph**  
Sweeping back into office on a wave of popular acclaim, Mayor Robson was elected Mayor of Guelph for an eighth term on Monday, when he defeated Ald. William Templeman in a straight fight by a majority of 841. Robson polled a total of 3,831 votes against 2,190 secured by his opponent. Despite the fact that the entire Aldermanic vote was re-elected by acclamation, the vote polled in the civic elections was exceedingly large, balloting for a municipal Board of Education, the first in Guelph's history, stirring up considerable interest. In a field of 13 candidates, of whom nine were elected to the 1934 Board, Dr. J. P. MacKinnon headed the poll with 2,355 votes. Mrs. C. R. Crowe, the only woman member of the Board, ran second with 2,149. Only one by-law was submitted to the voters, who turned down a proposal for the city to issue \$300,000 in debentures to permit the municipality to re-assume management of the Guelph Radial Railway, at present operated by the Hydro Power Commission. The vote was 1,510 to 670 against the by-law.

**Jon. Gibbons Elected Mayor of Georgetown**  
J. B. Mackenzie, for three consecutive years acclaimed Mayor of Georgetown, was defeated by Joseph Gibbons on Monday, for the past three years a member of Council, who won his advancement by a majority of 296 votes. In Ward Three Dr. Joseph MacAndrew, who protested the arrests of taxes accumulating in the town, headed the poll with 259 votes. A. E. Parr, member of former Councils, was returned and W. Thompson, aspirant to a seat on the Council, defeated. The proposed grant of half a mill of the town's levy to the Band was defeated by a majority of 206. The vote was taken at the request of the Lorne Rifles Band executive that, if granted, the half mill levy might be applied to the salary of Bandmaster A. H. Perrott. The Band offered in return free concerts during the summer. Supported by the sporting fraternity of the town, the Daylight Saving By-law carried by a majority of 80 votes. Figures of the election, by wards, were as follows: Mayorally, Ward One, Joseph Gibbons 185, J. B. Mackenzie 70; Ward Two, Joseph Gibbons 222, J. B. Mackenzie 79; Ward Three, Jos. Gibbons 190, J. B. Mackenzie 157; Totals, Joseph Gibbons 507, J. B. Mackenzie 301. Councilors, Ward Three only two to be elected, Dr. Joseph MacAndrew 259, A. B. Parr 220, W. Thompson 100. Daylight Saving, Ward One, for 143, against 98; Ward Two, for 140, against 155; Ward Three, for 193, against 143. Band grant, Ward One, for 27, against 99; Ward Two, for 42, against 125; Ward Three, for 62, against 118.

## VISITING BAND APPRECIATED

Splendid Concert Provided by the Guelph Musical Society Band in Acton Town Hall on Sunday Evening

In spite of the disagreeable weather prevailing last Sunday evening a splendid audience assembled to hear the concert in the Town Hall by the Guelph Musical Society Band. The Guelph organization comprises about thirty or thirty-five members and every number on their programme proved a pleasure.

Reeve E. Thelford was Chairman and introduced the artists to the audience. He spoke of the pleasure it was to have this interchange of concerts between bands and welcomed the visiting musicians to Acton. President L. Cunningham, of the Guelph organization, spoke the appreciation of the band for the reception accorded their appearance and he hoped to have the pleasure of presenting Acton Band to a Guelph audience after the new year.

Two numbers on the programme touched a responsive chord in everyone. The audience remained standing while the band played the hymn, "Fight the Good Fight," in memory of Gen. Currie, and later in the programme the hymn, "For All the Saints Who from Their Labors Rest," in honor of the late John C. Hill, who was associated with Acton Band for over half a century, and for many of these years as its bandmaster.

## General Interest News

**St. Alban's Successful Bazaar**  
On Saturday the Women's Auxiliary held their annual bazaar and sale of home-made baking in the Parish Hall. Tables were filled with baking and sewing to supply everyone's need, and tea was served from 3:00 till 6:00 o'clock. Mr. Lewis, who is in charge of St. Alban's Church at present, came with Mrs. Lewis and exhibited a wonderful display of articles made by the Chinese, given to them when they came back from China, after spending ten years as missionaries there. These added greatly to the bazaar.

**Woman in Hospital, Accidentally Shot**  
Shot in the abdomen when a gun which her husband was handling accidentally discharged in her home in Puslinch Township on Tuesday, Mrs. Samuel Bennett, R. R. No. 6, Guelph, is in serious condition at the Guelph General Hospital. She is the third patient admitted to the hospital this week suffering from similar wounds in accidental shootings. Audrey McKenzie, 13, of Terra Cotta, and Mrs. Elias, of Orton, being the others. It is reported Mrs. Bennett was lying on a couch, when the shotgun, held by her husband, accidentally discharged as he was making repairs to the weapon.

**Erin Girl Accidentally Shot**  
Audrey McKenzie, 14-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James McKenzie, was removed to Guelph General Hospital following a shooting accident at the home of Wm. Beers, a neighbor, living on the township of Erin and Caledon. Audrey, in company with her brother, Roy, aged 9, had gone to Mr. Beers on an errand, arriving there just as Beers returned to his house from hunting. Beers left his rifle standing by the woodshed, while he entered the house to get an article for the children. While he was inside the boy picked up the rifle, which accidentally discharged, the bullet lodging in his sister's abdomen. This child was removed to Guelph General Hospital, where an operation was performed for the removal of the bullet.

## Council Requests Statement from Cemetery Board Immediately

Department of National Defence Willing to Assume a Share of Lighting Costs at Arena—Personnel of Welfare Board Named by Council—Highway Construction Briefly Mentioned—Insurance Transferred from Toronto Agency to Acton Agency—Accounts of \$852.38 Sanctioned for Payment.

At the meeting of the Acton Council on Monday evening, Councillors W. A. Lasby, E. Jones, J. E. McMillan and S. M. Lasby were present and Reeve E. Thelford presided.

Correspondence was read from Mr. P. L. Wright regarding the policy carried by the Fire Brigade. Mr. Wright was also present to give any information desired in this matter. His letter gave details as to rates and the features of the protection his company was prepared to offer. Mr. Wright explained that he did not wish to take the business from any other local agent. It is at present handled by a Toronto agent. It was considered that this business should be given locally and the features of the new policy appealed to the Council as better protection for the members of the Fire Brigade, and the business was therefore given to Mr. Wright.

The report was adopted. A letter was received from the Secretary of the Welfare Committee pointing out the fact that the term of office of this organization was completed. By motion the personnel of the Welfare Board was outlined by the Council, subject, of course, to the willingness of the parties to act on the Board.

A letter from the Department of National Defence stated that the Department was willing to assume an equitable share of lighting charges at the Arena. The Department felt, however, that fifty per cent. of the cost was not a fair proportion and outlined the amount that they felt should be charged. The Council was agreeable to a flat charge for lighting of \$2.50 per month, or \$30 per year, and the Clerk was instructed to draft a reply, outlining this proposal.

The matter of the insurance on the Arena was discussed and it was felt that the premium was very high. The matter was left over until the next meeting for definite consideration. Councillor S. M. Lasby brought up the matter of the highway construction on the second line. He asked for information regarding the rumors of employment for men from the northern section of the County on the work. Reeve Thelford agreed to make inquiry when at the County Council meeting in Milton next Tuesday.

The matter of accounting of Cemetery Board matters was introduced by Councillor W. A. Lasby, who felt this matter should be straightened out before the close of the year. Councillor Jones would have nothing to do with the matter and the motion made covering the question lacked a seconder. Councillor S. M. Lasby refused to second the motion on the ground that he had nothing to do with the forming of the Board and would only sanction action on its dismissal. Councillor McMillan acceded to the request to second the motion, on the ground that a request for a statement could do no harm. The following motion was passed, with Councillor Jones refusing to record a vote on the matter.

Moved by W. A. Lasby, seconded by J. E. McMillan, that the Clerk be instructed to write to Mr. C. M. Hansen as Secretary-Treasurer of the Acton Cemetery Board, and request him to have his books balanced and prepare and leave with him, the Clerk, a statement showing the financial condition of the cemetery not later than December 15 next. Carried.

The Clerk was instructed to advertise for tenders for the position of Secretary of the Arena.

The matter of letting the concession at the Arena was also discussed but no definite action was taken.

**Change in Bank Staff**

Mr. and Mrs. Nisbet have made a number of friends during their residence in Acton and all regret their removal from Acton but wish them every success in their new home in Alliston.

**Two Killed in Level Crossing Accident**  
A sedan raced into the path of a train at Guelph last Friday and carried one man to instant death and another sustained such serious injuries that he died a few days later as a result. John O. Querlin, of Kitchener, driver of the car, was taken from the wreckage dead. His companion, 16-year-old William Crane, of Guelph, died on Saturday. Querlin was following a truck which barely crossed the track in front of the train.

**Shower for Bazaar**  
A very successful shower was held in the Parish Hall on Thursday last by the Women's Auxiliary of St. Alban's Church. After the parcels were opened everyone joined in the fun. A good programme was arranged with games and contests, the winners being Mrs. G. Woods, Mrs. Snow, Miss Frances Jennings; after which a good lunch was served and everyone expressed themselves as having a jolly good time.

**Barn Burned in Nelson Township**  
During the severe electrical storm, which visited this district last week, the bank barn and adjoining buildings on Hilbert Gowland's farm, townline, Nelson, was struck by lightning and destroyed, as were also 75 hens, loss \$5,000, partly covered by insurance. Mr. Gowland, who was in the barn at the time, was shocked by the bolt of lightning, which set the barn on fire, but we are pleased to say, he is recovering.—Milton Champion.

**Ebenezer W. M. S. Annual Meeting**  
The annual meeting of Ebenezer Women's Missionary Society was held at the home of Mrs. E. Mew, with a large attendance. A "Pot Luck" dinner was called for 12:30, and served in cafeteria style. It proved to be a good luck dinner with an appetizing variety of food served by the ladies. Following dinner the election of officers was held, when Mrs. J. Marshall was elected President; Mrs. Miller, Secretary; and Mrs. J. T. Kitching, Treasurer. It was also decided that the group system will be carried on throughout the year.

They are now taking a well-earned rest at their new home on Ontario Street. Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald were admirably fitted for the Government position they filled. Mr. MacDonald has always been very kind to those under his charge, using just the right degree of firmness to impress prisoners with the fact that his orders were to be obeyed. Mrs. MacDonald has a very kindly, sympathetic disposition which eminently fitted her for the position of Matron. Though Grand Jurors have for many years inspected the District Jail and then in their reports condemned the old building, they have invariably pointed out that Warden MacDonald kept the jail well. Years after people who have served terms of imprisonment in the District Jail have become respectable citizens, they have called on Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald to show their gratitude for the kindly treatment received at their hands. Braosebridge citizens are glad that Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald, who have been popular residents of Braosebridge for the past thirty-five years, will continue to reside in town."
