The pigs were fed under both inside and outside conditions and were given an addition of green feed their rations. The barley fed lots averaged slightly higher in average daily gains and would thus be ready for market somewhat sooner. The barley lots gained 1.22 pounds per pig per day, while the corn lots gained 1.16 pounds per pig daily. The barley and corn were evaluated in the meal mixtures at the same cost. The barley lots cost \$7.67 per cwt. gain while the corn lots cost \$7.78 per cwt gain. It is obvious that the differences in both daily gains and cost per cwt. gain were almost negligible. However, the results show that barley and com when combined with other grains have practically the same

feeding value for growing and fattening Results of experiments at other insti tutions on the feeding of batley and corn as single grains have shown corn to have a slightly higher feeding value. However, under Canadian conditions where there are generally oats and sometimes mill feeds available to supplement barley feeding, barley will prove the equal of

corn pound, for pound. In another experiment carried out at the Nappan Experimental Farm on corn versus barley for hogs, it was found that the barley was much superior in bacon type to the corn fed lot. It is a common observation that barley when properly supplemented with other grains and protein feeds, produces an excellent bacon careass which generally contains a firm-

Under Study

During the past two seasons an intensive study has been under way of a group of new wheat varieties noted chiefly for their ability to withstance stem rust. # Look After the Ice House

At this time of the year a farmer should thoroughly inspect his ice house, says the architect at the Central Experimental Farm. Repair any little job before it becomes a big and costly job. ## WINTER FEEDING MARKET PIGS

Winter feeding of market pigs requires a specialized procedure since pastu:es are not available, and the pigs must be reared entirely without this form of exercise and green feed. Thus the winter ration must be supplemented, so that these depreciations will be made up. Succulence in the form of wellcured alfalfa or clover hay should be fed to pigs of over 100 pounds, while pigs under their weight should receive milk. No roots, or even a small amount of the above-mentioned hay. Hay or roots As a typical example, an experiment should not be made the sole feed for winter fed hogs. In fact, it is not always be even advisable to use hay under the self-feeding system where the pigs can eat all they desire. Rather, hay of good quality should be fed in limited amounts. the pigs deriving the large part of their nutriment from a mixture of coarse

Mineral mixtures are more important n winter feeding than during the summer when the pigs have access to the earth through use of pastures. 'A selffeeder with a constant supply of mixed minerals is well worth while. Another good supplement to winters feeding is the regular use of sods. From the way pigs, work over a sod thrown to them there is evidently considerable mineral nutriment gained from this source. Salt i needless to say, is a very necessary constituent of the swine ration and its use pays its actual cost many times over.

A good eastern mineral mixture is: Bone meal or bone char, 25 pounds; round limestone, 50 pounds; and salt, 25 pounds. This can be used in a selffeeder, or by mixing in the meal ration. at the ration of 1 to 2 per cent.

Western mineral mixture: Slacked coal, 76 pounds; salt, 20 pounds; air slacked lime or ground limestone. 3 pounds; and sulphur, I pounds. This should be used in a self-feeder, glvling the pigs free access to the mixture at all times.




