Hiram Waliace Celebrated 103rd Birthday to an abundance of hard work, Hiram Wallace, the oldest resident of this district, celebrated his 103rd birthday school. quietly on Tuesday at the home of his daughter, Miss Ann J. Wallace, 35 Glasgow Street, Guelph. Mr. Wallace had been confined to his bed for a short period, but is now up and around again with a remarkable vigor for one so far advanced in years. His only regret is that he is not now able to partake of each meal, or the occasional cigar, as his accustomed pipe of tobacco after these have been denied him because of possible injurious effect. He is in full possession of all faculties, except that his eyesight has not been the best for the past few years. Mr. Wallace has lived his entire life in this district, his father and mother coming from County Armagh. Ireland, and settling in Nassagaweya 108 years ago. "Grandpa." as he is familiarly known, recalls that when he was a boy, business in this section was done in Burlington, 20 miles away. and often that distance was made on foot and considered as nothing. Only four families lived in Nassagaweya at that time. The following is the report of the Commissioners of the House of Refuge to the Members of the Councils of the Counties of Halton and Peel. Gentlemen:

Your Commissioners beg to report

In submitting this report of the House of Refuge for this year to date, we feel that we have had a very successful year in connection with the Home, the crops on the farm were better than the average, and the live stock has done well, and while we have had a greater number of inmates in the Home than heretofore, the number being 93 at one time during the year, but while we have had an increase of inmates, due to the amount of produce raised on the farm, the cash expenditure for maintenance of the Home has not increased in proportion to the increase of inmates. All the meat consumed this year has been raised and killed on the farm and about 50% of the butter used has been made at the Home. The inmates are given milk to drink every day and all the eggs produced are used in the Home.

In submitting an estimate in the beginning of the year of the amounts required from the Countles for maintenance, \$800.00 from each County was the amounts calculated to be required; the above amounts would have been ample to carry us through the year, but, owing to the condition of the roof over of \$200.00.
