## SEED POTATOES

Not Sold or Advertised

Any Potate Can be Used for Seed but

There is nothing in the regulations of the Destructive Insect and Pest Act governing seed potatoes intended to convey said the millionaire. the impression that only certified seed can lawfully be used for seed purposes. As a matter of fact, says the Dominion Department of Agriculture, any other enyone, but only certified seed potatoes self, and rose to go on the instant. may be advertised and sold as seed potatoes. It is an indictable offence under millionaire esked. Canada uncertified potatoes as seed that I would interview you personally, potatoes, or to use any kind of seed tag that's all!" was 'the reply. likely to mislead the public. Growers, dealers and associations, however, are permitted to attach their own tags or brands, or to mark any container of seed potatoes with any special description, but such may be done only when, in addition, the official certification tag is present on the container.

It is to be clearly understood that certified seed does not mean seed potatoes that are entirely free from all discases, for such a result is scarcely possible under field conditions, but every effort is made to inspect and pass only tubers from fields that are well kept, and show only a very small percentage of disease, and where plants are vigorous and true to variety. The request to use certified seed proceeds from a desire to - improve and increase Canada's crop and not for the mere purpose of inspecting field. Seed potatoes must be in good condition before the official tags are attached to shipments, but, on the other the year. hand, the public must realise that potatoes cannot stand rough handling, high temperatures, or wet conditions in storage, because rot is almost sure to set to if such conditions prevail.
